Harris Your Place

Harris Your Place is a £16 million project set to restore and reimagine The Harris for 21st century audiences as a cultural learning space. This project aims to protect the building, our collections and the stunning architecture for future generations whilst enhancing accessibility and positioning The Harris as a community hub for Preston and Lancashire.

The capital project is more than simply preserving this much-loved building; The Harris wants to ensure that it remains a vibrant heart of the community, a place where people want to spend their time.



Harris Your Place Updates

You may have noticed that The Harris' exterior covering has been taken down as the scaffolding underneath is coming down in phases from each of The Harris' facades. The careful stonework cleaning, regilding of the pediment inscriptions, and window repairs have now been completed externally. Works are still ongoing internally by Conlon Constructions and other local trades in preparation for a 2025 reopening.









At 130 years old, the exterior of The Harris building is undergoing a major transformation to restore it to its former glory. The latest restoration efforts involved the delicate application of around 2,300 80mm x 80mm leaves of 24ct gold to the pediment inscription. As the scaffolding begins to come down around the building you may notice the shiny new gold lettering!

Orbis Conservation

A number of our collection items, including this earthenware lion, were recently taken out of storage in preparation for Orbis Mount Makers' visit. The items were then measured by Orbis, specialists in framing and mounting, in preparation for the individual mounts that they will be creating to display the pieces.

The Harris Library

Harkness Study Day

Speakers and musicians gathered at Lancashire Archives on October 21 for an enjoyable study day looking at the life and work of broadside ballad printer John Harkness. His extensive collection of street songs published in Preston between the 1840s and 1890s have recently been digitised and contain an intriguing window into Victorian street culture. This collaboration between The Harris, UCLan and Lancashire Archives brought together speakers who talked about how the ballads fit into the wider history of performance and the intriguing 'between the lines' perspective they can offer on a range of subjects. The day also featured a rare performance from musicians Gregg Butler and Tom Walsh of Strawhead.




The complimentary tickets really helped to remove financial barriers for the group making it fully accessible. We enjoyed being together and being outside of the centre where we normally meet as we were able to get to know each other a bit more. The John Moores Painting Prize got us all talking about what 'good' art is, especially the painting 'Born Died' by Richie Culver. This exhibition challenged our perception of what art could be. The trip has definitely inspired the group, so watch this space for what they create next!

- "I come to the art group for the social aspect meeting new people and I've started to make some good friends. I used to spend a lot of time in my flat and it's shown me there's a world out there. I get to spread my wings and meet people. I also go to the social Tuesday meetings."
- "I appreciated the complexity of some of the art. Some of them were rubbish and some of them were alright. I enjoyed the atmosphere of the gallery, the calmness, like being in church. I felt relaxed in there. I may not have liked all the art on the walls but there was a peaceful atmosphere."
- "It was my first time going to a gallery. I was surprised at how much I enjoyed the atmosphere. I enjoyed some of the paintings because they reminded me of some of the people in my life in a joking manner."

In an effort to forge a deeper connection with an audience of young people, The Harris has welcomed two new members of staff to their team. As young people themselves, Nanci and Almaas will be working to engage other young people with The Harris.





Nanci: Content and Marketing Assistant

Nanci is working alongside the marketing team to create content for The Harris' social media platforms, website and other Harris publications. One of her main aims in this role is to find new and exciting ways to promote The Harris and its events, with a particular focus on accessing an audience of young people.

Nanci said: "I'm thrilled to be a part of The Harris' marketing team. I have many fond memories of visiting The Harris when I was growing up, so to be behind the scenes now is such a fantastic experience.

I absolutely adore anything creative, so this role is incredibly fulfilling to me."

"After completing my film studies, journalism, and investigative journalism degrees, I was worried that I wouldn't find many opportunities to show my creative side, but The Harris allows me so much creative freedom and I love being surrounded by other creative people at work, it is wonderfully inspiring.

History, the arts, and all things culture are hugely important to me and I'm really excited to share my love for those things with others, especially young people. I really want to encourage other people my age to engage with the museum, art gallery and library now and when it fully reopens in 2025.

I really hope that, in this role, I can show young people how important they are to The Harris - we are the future, after all!"

Almaas: Events and Social Media Co-ordinator

Almaas is working with the Communities team to encourage a focus on young people. She is working on developing an event, specifically targeted at young people, and is using her role within The Harris to be a voice for the wider community of young people in and around Preston. While working at The Harris, Almaas wants to ensure that young people are included and involved in everything The Harris does.

Almaas said: "Receiving this opportunity to be able to work alongside the Harris Team has been wonderful to experience. I am lucky to work alongside a team of friendly and capable people who are always willing to help out.

Prior to this role, I studied English Literature at the University of Central Lancashire and am now able to provide a voice for the fellow young people of Preston. As well as working with capable co-workers, I get to meet the general public specifically young people of Preston and can receive direct feedback in relation to my current project.

I feel as if this is one of the most important parts of my role here, at The Harris, to be a voice among the young people in the city. We aim to reach out to them to provide a better Preston for them to enjoy and a safe and inclusive community."

The Harris Youth Panel Update

Eight young people aged 12 to 17 currently make up The Harris' Youth Panel. Two of the young people have been part of the panel since at least 2020 - that's dedication for you! The panel meets once a month, and for the past three meetings, they have been getting their heads around how the new young people's space 'No.9' at The Harris might run. They have been transporting their imaginations through time to 2025 to imagine what kind of atmosphere 'No.9' will have and what kind of attitudes they hope Harris staff will have towards all the different types of young people that will use 'No.9'.



The panel have recently met up with the Access All Areas Project which is led by young disabled people and professional poet Helena Ascough. They gave the panel lots of advice! In particular, they discussed how to make activities, projects and events for young people more accessible and inclusive through things like awareness of dietary requirements and allergies if they provide refreshments; locations for activities and making sure that they are easy to get to and safe; dates and times that suit young people; Autism awareness and thinking about young people that might need quiet spaces to go to if they get sensory overloads.

The panel also talked for the first time about young people who are parents and how to consider their needs so they can still get involved and not feel excluded from The Harris' events for young people.

The Hub



Some of our customers that used to come into The Harris to use the computers regularly have still been using the computers in the temporary IT centre in the Guild Hall. They were involved in the decision making process to select a display of paintings for The Hub. We felt that they would know better than us about what might suit the regular visitors that will be using that room once we reopen.



We invited all the current users of the IT centre to consultation sessions with us and we have now had three sessions with a group of enthusiasts. We have been humbled at their vested interest in The Harris and their consideration of the needs of others.



We started the first session off with a selection of our own choices to narrow it down and get us started. But boy oh boy, did we get it wrong! We were soon put right by the group and they have now guided us in the right direction. The group wanted paintings that were for 'local people', things that the people of Preston could relate to. They wanted to see things that they thought were easy to read and easy to understand; calming and possibly traditional. Kind on the eye in other words! They felt that the art on display needed to act as a temporary distraction for anyone using the room as they might need a break from the computer screens. This group is going to curate their chosen paintings, four of which can be seen here, in the room themselves - positioning each one so that it complements the others and in places in the room that will please other visitors.

Introducing Our New Acquisitions

We are excited to announce we have more new costume and fashion acquisitions joining The Harris collections.





This Saree Suit, designed by Felix Roche, BA Fashion Design student at UCLan (University of Central Lancashire), was shown as part of his graduate collection 'Saree Not Sorry' in June 2023. Felix is from London and is of Sri Lankan Tamil heritage. This design symbolises a mixture of Eastern and Western cultures as well as traditional tailoring with traditional South Asian dress.

Felix achieved this by using knots on the sleeves to symbolise the marriage of both his cultures, but also to symbolise the Hindu wedding tradition of tying the newlyweds' garments together – typically the bride's veil and the groom's sash. Alongside combining the fluidity of draping and pleating from traditional sarees to a Western suit, Felix hopes to emasculate the common perception attached to it and instead allow the garments to exist as gender-neutral pieces.

The Saree Suit will occupy an exhibition space dedicated to identity when we reopen in 2025.

Wedding Dress



We have acquired this wedding dress from a Preston dressmaker, Hatfield and Butler, in purple grosgrain silk with a ruffled cream silk collar and cuffs and pearl border trim.

The wedding dress was made by a Preston dressmaker and has their label on the inside waist tape, which reads Butler & Hatfield, Costumier & Milliners, Preston.

In the 19th century, there was a fashion for British dressmakers to style themselves as 'costumiers' to sound more attractive to the fashionable elite. This dress was worn by the great grandmother of the donor's husband, and the wedding took place on 20 May 1899.

Black Lycra Binder



We have acquired this black lycra binder, hand painted with flowers and the words 'When in Bloom'.

The binder was created by Ollie Coles, a tattoo artist based here in Preston. Ollie painted the binder as a reaction to the transphobia he experienced - creating something beautiful out of pain.

'When in Bloom' refers to coming into yourself, progress, growth, and becoming the person you truly are. The Harris acquired Ollie's binder so we can share and preserve his story with our communities and for future generations. Keep an eye on our social media for even more new acquisitions coming soon!


